Oral Statement

Make Mothers Matter congratulates OHCHR on its report on Care and Support.

However, we regret that **mothers** — **the primary caregivers worldwide** — **are not mentioned even once.**

Women who are mothers bear the brunt of unpaid care work, often at the cost of their careers, income, and pension in old age. This **Motherhood Penalty** is a major driver of gender inequality and economic hardship for women — yet it remains invisible.

In fact, according to a recent MMM survey, a staggering **50% of mothers in Europe report suffering from a mental health condition**. And in too many countries, becoming a mother still means risking one's life.

By failing to name mothers, we fail to address the unique discrimination, human rights violations and challenges they face. We also fail to leverage their power as changemaker.

It is time to recognise women in their role as mothers.

It is time to put motherhood at the heart of gender equality.
