

UN Commission of the Status of Women 69th Session – Beijing+30 General Discussion Oral Statement

Mr/Madam Chair, Excellencies, distinguished delegates,

Thirty years after the Beijing Platform for Action, women—especially mothers—continue to take on the vast majority of unpaid care and domestic work – A care gap that comes at the cost of their financial autonomy, career progression, and long-term security—including pensions.

This **'Motherhood Penalty'** is a key driver of gender inequality and economic hardship, yet it remains largely **unmeasured**, **unacknowledged**, **and invisible**.

The reality is stark: A recent Make Mothers Matter survey found that 50% of mothers in Europe report suffering from a mental health condition. And in too many countries, becoming a mother still means risking one's life.

Yet, time and again, discussions on gender equality **ignore** motherhood. By failing to even say the word *mothers*, we fail to recognize the unique **discrimination**, human rights violations, and systemic **barriers** they face.

We also miss a crucial opportunity—because empowering mothers is **not** about restricting women to one role, but about ensuring that motherhood is factored into policies that drive **substantive gender equality** – **whether** in the workplace, society, or politics.

We welcome the recognition of maternity-related discrimination in the agreed conclusions. But let's be clear: **Motherhood remains the unfinished business of Beijing.**

We urge governments to:

- Acknowledge and address the specific discrimination and challenges faced by mothers in policymaking.
- Close the data gap—measure the Motherhood Penalty and make it visible.

Women should **never** be penalized for being mothers. At *Make Mothers Matter*, we say it loud and clear: **It's time to put motherhood at the heart of gender equality discussions. This is not an option—it's an imperative.**
