


Mahjouba Edbouche was born in Agadir, Morocco. Her parents married her off at the young age of 16. When she was 24, her husband died leaving her a widow with 2 young children and pregnant with a 3rd. She had to raise, educate and support her children alone. She was fortunate to find a good job that led to many years with an organization called Terre des Hommes. In 2012 she founded the Ahddane association, of which she remains President to date. This association helps single women and women who, like Majhouba, have had to fight against social injustices to educate their children alone. Ahddane supports single mothers with legal and emotional advice.

Jean Philippe Byamungu Tchagazi was born in 1981 in the village of Muhanga, on the outskirts of Goma, the capital of the province of North Kivu, in the east of the DRC. His father died when he was very young, leaving Jean-Philippe in the care of his maternal family who brought him up. It is thanks to his mother that he was able to go to school and get an education. Sensitive to the suffering of children and mothers, Jean-Philippe decided to work for the most vulnerable in his society. He is the co-founder and coordinator of the successful agro-ecological farm HAD-VSK (a project supported by En Avant les Enfants). The school was founded to train, restore dignity and empower young girls who have become mothers through rape, and have, as a consequence, been abandoned by their community.

Marie Tozer is in charge of communications and sponsorship for La Maison de Tom Pouce. She is the spokesperson for the association's 25 employees and all the mothers it cares for. Since 1987, the association's project has been driven by an unwavering desire to help all pregnant women in difficulty or in danger, as a result of pregnancy. This mission has never changed, and the association runs a social establishment approved by the Child Welfare Office. Every year, they take in an average of 70 pregnant women or women who have just given birth, and 35 newborn babies. Precariousness, violence, migratory wanderings and emotional fragility do not prevent women from loving their babies and rebuilding their lives. La Maison de Tom Pouce helps them to achieve that goal.


Lydia was brought to Warm Hearts Children's Home, an orphanage that supports needy students in Kibera slums – Nairobi, at the age of 14. Before that, she lived in extreme poverty and suffered abuse from stepmothers and an alcoholic and violent father. The orphanage found a sponsor to pay for her education and she finished high school with success in 2010. She then graduated from Tangaza College in 2014 where she completed a Bachelor of Arts in Social Communication with honors. In 2017, she decided to launch Passion to Share Foundation with a mentorship program for girls born or living with HIV whom she

had met in rural Kenya and in Nairobi slums. In 2020, she established a skills center with vocational training in Kibera slums to support teenage girls and young mothers. In 2021, she started Kokomelon, a daycare for the babies of the young mothers following the skills program. Now Kokomelon welcomes children from the age of 4 months to 5 years old. In 2022, Passion to Share developed its own brand called Miyó's Creation to give young mothers a marketing platform to promote their own products. Recently, Lydia established Genowa (Hope in Luo language), a table-banking program to allow young mothers to save and take interest-free loans for business startup or development. Lydia is very passionate about helping young women lacking means and networking to be able to become financially independent.
